SPEJ's Business Areas

Sony Pictures Entertainment (Japan) Inc. (SPEJ) is a subsidiary of U.S. based Sony Pictures Entertainment (SPE). SPE's global operations encompass motion picture production, acquisition and distribution; television production, acquisition and distribution; television networks; digital content creation and distribution; operation of studio facilities; and development of new entertainment products, services and technologies.

■ Film Distribution Business

SPEJ's film distribution group distributes movies created by SPE's Motion Picture Group, which includes five film labels: Columbia Pictures, TriStar Pictures, Screen Gems, Sony Pictures Animation and Sony Pictures Classics. SPE's film library encompasses more than 3,500 theatrical films including 12 Best Picture Academy Award winners. In addition, SPEJ distributes sublicensed or acquired Japanese and foreign films.

■ Home Entertainment Business

Utilizing the best and newest technologies, including DVD, Blu-ray Disc™, digital delivery and mobile access, SPEJ makes great entertainment content available to consumers wherever they are. SPEJ's home entertainment offerings range from award-winning films and global blockbusters to the latest Japanese and foreign films, which it sublicenses or acquires. SPEJ also embraces Sony's cutting-edge technologies, making master content available in 4K ULTRA HD™ Disc.

■ Television Distribution Business

SPEJ licenses products from SPE's library to broadcasting stations and on-demand service providers in Japan. SPE's library consists of more than 3,500 theatrical films, over 50,000 episodes of serial programs and 22,000 episodes of reality shows, including many Emmy and Golden Globe Award winners.

■ Television Network Business

SPEJ's television networks division represents SONY group channels, including Animax, Kids Station, AXN, AXN Mystery and Music on! TV, in distribution deals with CATV, IPTV and other media platforms.

■ Local Production Business

SPEJ's production division creates Japanese movies as SPE's International Film & Television Production initiative which produces local-language movies in major territories over the world. Lead by Columbia Pictures, SPE has been created more than 3,500 theatrical films.
